





First to create a Quality Rating & Improvement System (QRIS) in 1998. 96% of child care payments are paid to a 2 or 3 Star facility.



Copayments are capped at 7% of a family's income, decreasing copays for most families. Family of four grossing \$60K/year is eligible for assistance.



Rates for infants and toddlers in a 2 Star program are 65% of the market




How States Are Spending Additional Funds


